Young people aged 12-17 are taking part in an ambitious project across 2,000 acres of the Brecon Beacons to help tackle the decline in British wildlife. Organisers, the environmental charity Action for Conservation, say the project is the largest youth-led nature restoration scheme of its kind in the world in terms of the geographical area covered.

Twenty young people from diverse backgrounds will work with tenant farmers, landowners and local people to enhance habitats in an attempt to protect the local flora and fauna. It is hoped the programme will create a global "gold standard" for youth-led environmental action. The team

began by carrying out ecological surveys across the site this month, and the next phase of work will begin in September.

Under the young people's management, the project seeks to restore habitats and ecosystems, and explore innovative approaches to farming and forestry. Low input, high impact solutions that rely on natural processes will be prioritised.

Willow, 16, from Cardiff, is among the inaugural members of the youth leadership group. She told Positive News she was "so excited" to be taking part: "The natural world is in real trouble, in Wales and beyond, and we need to work together to find creative ways to turn this situation around by working with the tenant farmers, landowners and conservationists. I really hope that we can demonstrate the value.

of putting young people at the heart of positive environmental change and inspire other projects to take a similar approach, she said."

Gareth Davies, a tenant farmer whose family have farmed the estate for three generations, added: "This is an inspiring project and we are looking forward to working together with these **passionate** young people to show how nature restoration can go hand in hand with sustainable farming practices, to make sure we maintain healthy soils, clean water and vital wildlife species long into the future."

We meet some of the pioneering climate-savvy educators, who are preparing children to help protect the planet. The debate has raged in recent months: is the climate crisis being given due prominence on school curriculums? Four young students at Cheney school think not, and so in March launched a petition calling for more lessons on the subject. The petition has since been signed by almost 82,000 people.

Though climate change is taught in science and geography lessons, critics say that isn't enough. But rather than waiting for the UK government to integrate the subject into the curriculum further, teachers are taking matters into their own hands by enrolling on the United Nations' Climate Change Teacher Academy.

The new online course provides free training for primary and secondary school teachers, arming them with the knowledge they need to introduce climate change into other parts of the curriculum. "We don't have time to waste. We can't wait for governments to pull their fingers out, we need to get on with it," said Melanie Harwood, whose company, Harwood Education, is helping to deliver the training programme in the UK.

Bec Wakefield was the first teacher in the UK to become accredited under the UN's Climate Change Teacher Academy and Rebecca Stacey from Castle Carrock primary school was the first headteacher to graduate from the academy, which launched in April. Stacey said that she was inspired to enrol by her students, who, like many young people, have become more engaged with environmental topics.

The academy course takes around 25 hours to complete and consists of five modules, considering the climate crisis through the prisms of gender, politics and health, among other topics. Teachers get access to up-to-date UN research as well as case studies to use in lessons. They can also share lesson plans with each other on a forum. The course provides training on how to teach climate change through the prisms of gender, politics and health, among other topics. Ben King, a science teacher at Churston Ferrers Grammar School, is currently taking part in the academy. He admitted that teachers are already overstretched, but believes it is worth making time for the training.
